Yes, thank you to the 20 speakers from Africa, Asia, Australia, Europe, North America and the two Food Environment Mentors (INFORMAS Module Leaders) who interacted with all or most of the over 600 registrants from 54 countries (*read out list below*). Although the daily average number via zoom was about 160, the daily average number reached via livestreaming on social media has been about 500. There is no doubt that together we can. Together we can mobilize and motivate the needed interest in food environment research, together we are building capacity in the area to generate evidence for advocacy for practice, for policy.

To this end, regionally, we are working closely with, coordinating, and synergizing with others to form what would be Africa's largest network of food environment researchers. e.g. Prof Adama Diouf and her team from Senegal are mobilizing Francophone Africa, whilst the MEALS4NCDs focuses on Anglophone Africa. We are also interested in engaging continental nutrition societies such as ANS, and FANUS.

Globally, we are working closely with INFORMAS, and hope to do so with the Drivers of Food Choice Consortium, the ANH and IMMANA Group, the Netherlands Food Partnership, Rockefeller Foundation, the new Community of Practice being coordinated by Mark Spires of City University of London (just to mention a few).

And so, as we close, I wanted to let you know that the closing of this meeting is not an end, but a beginning for what we hope will be a very fruitful and impactful collaboration with you all. We will be

in touch to share the proceedings of the meeting, and to discuss how you may wish to contribute to FERN.
